TŌ TĀTOU HAPORI AKORANGA OUR LEARNING COMMUNITY

We strive to develop in our students a strong sense of community based on agreed values. It is important that students can work cooperatively in a team and be able to take a positive leadership role. We provide a wide range of opportunities for our students to contribute to our school and wider community.

He Tīwai Mātauranga Heaton Normal Intermediate is located in the rohe of the Te Ngāi Tūāhuriri rūnanga, with a tribal area extending from the Main Divide to the sea, bounded by the Hurunui and Hakatere rivers.

We have been gifted our name from Ngāi Tūāhuriri. He Tīwai Mātauranga translates to 'The Trunk of Knowledge'. The name reflects the geographical and cultural aspects of this area. Tīwai, meaning tree trunk and mātauranga meaning knowledge, are derived from the school's relationship to the English Elm trees that historically lined the Papanui Road boundary and the significance of nearby podocarp forest, Pūtaringamotu.

Heaton Normal Intermediate is named after Sir Robert Heaton Rhodes the well known landowner, lawyer and politician whose Elmwood estate was purchased by the Canterbury Education Board on 23 August 1945. His name is reflected in other ways in and around the area, with the Elmwood Bowling Club land, the Elmwood Normal School land, and Elmwood Park all being part of the former estate of Sir Heaton Rhodes.

The school is proudly made up of six kaupeka which are named after native plants from this rohe area; Hīnau, Raukawa, Kōwhai, Kōtukutuku, Tūrutu and Amoka.

Each kaupeka selects head students who, together, form the School Council which works with our Principal on school and community projects.

Every student has opportunities to participate in a wide range of sports, cultural, music and academic activities.

We are an environmentally aware school. We believe it is important that our students are able to think beyond themselves and develop a sense of global citizenship and responsibility. Our students work on projects to promote sustainability in our community.

We are proud to have students from over 30 different countries in our school. These students enrich our learning community through their contributions in many areas of the school. Extensive support is provided for our international students.

AKORANGA TŪTURU AUTHENTIC STUDENT CENTRED LEARNING

Inquiry learning is a philosophy that underpins the way we teach in all areas of our school.

It is student centred, active learning approach focusing on questioning, critical thinking and problem-solving. Every student needs these skills, so all classes are involved in our school-wide inquiry learning programme.

Students immerse themselves in the topic, context or situation they are studying. The topic is one that is purposeful and meaningful for our students. They investigate the location, historical background, current situation, issues and problems associated with the topic. They become highly knowledgeable on the topic before beginning their own inquiry.

We have a well-resourced library known as Te Kāmata managed by a qualified librarian/ kaitiaki kāmata who supports students' research needs; teaches research and digital citizenship skills, and promotes reading for enjoyment.

Inquiry learning provides students with the opportunity to think deeply about issues and problems and develop creative solutions and ways to use their new learning.

WHAKAURUNGA - HE AHA ANĀINEI ENROLMENT - WHAT NEXT

He Tīwai Mātauranga Heaton Normal Intermediate School has an enrolment scheme to limit the roll, prevent overcrowding and to ensure all our students are well known to us all.

All students who live in-zone have an absolute right to enrol at our school. If you visit our website www.heaton.school.nz you will find our Heaton zone map, a description of our school zone and the enrolment form.

What if I live out of zone?

If you live outside the home zone, then you are still able to apply for enrolment. Students who apply out-of-zone will be accepted in the following order of priority:

• First Priority:

This priority is not applicable as we do not run a special programme approved by the Secretary of Education.

• Second Priority:

Will be given to applicants who are siblings of current students.

• Third Priority:

Will be given to siblings of former students.

• Fourth Priority:

Will be given to children of former students of the school.

• Fifth Priority:

Will be given to children of board employees or children of members of the board of the school.

• Sixth Priority:

Will be given to all other students. If there are more applicants in priority groups 1-5 than there are places available, selection within the priority group must be by ballot. Complete the online application form and include all requested documentation before the closing date, Wednesday 31st August, at 3.00pm

In-Zone Applicants

In-zone applicants will receive confirmation of their enrolment.

Out-of-Zone Applicants

Out-of-zone applicants will receive a letter of receipt of their application. By the end of Term 3, out-of-zone applicants will be informed about whether a place in our school can be offered.

International Student Enrolment

We welcome international students and their families. Enrolment information can be found on our website. You will be guided through the enrollment process with the option for digital translation if required.

What Happens After Enrolment is Confirmed?

In Term 4 you will receive information about:

 Opportunity for an interview with a member of our teaching staff to share information about your child.

Once this information is compiled, along with data gathered from your child's current school, you will receive information via the Hero App confirming your child's class placement and the start of the school year.





Early in 2023 we were delighted to move into the first stage of our new building programme and our first nine classes completed. In 2023 the work continues with the building of a second identical classroom block and the start of our new technology block, collaboratively designed with our specialist teaching team here at school.

We are anticipating the classes to be ready early 2024 and the technology space later in the 2024 academic year.

2023 will also see the establishment of our new playground and 4 new all-weather sports courts all due for completion by July 2023.

We have been fortunate that throughout our build programme we will retain classes for every student and have no need to repurpose halls or other spaces. Our Board and staff have made a commitment to ensuring the Heaton experience is not impaired by the building programme.

Visitors will notice that our Kura has opted to retain individual classrooms with the ability to collaborate between the rooms in preference to a full open plan concept. This is a conscious choice for our community and provides an alternative for parents and students to consider as part of the range of offerings in Christchurch.
